CHAPTER 1

$ALCOHOL^2$

SECTION

11-101. Drinking alcoholic beverages, on streets, etc.

11-101. <u>Drinking alcoholic beverages, on streets, etc.</u> It shall be unlawful for any person to drink or consume, or to have an open can, bottle or other container of beer or any intoxicating liquor in or on any public street, alley, avenue, highway, sidewalk, public park, public school ground, shopping center premises, parking apron of any business or other public place, unless such place has a beer or intoxicating liquor dispensing permit and license for on premise consumption and such drinking, consuming, or having open, is in compliance with the rules, regulations, and ordinances relative to such on premises consumption. OFFENSES AGAINST THE PEACE AND QUIET

- 11-201. Disturbing the peace.
- 11-202. Anti-noise regulations.
- 11-201. <u>Disturbing the peace</u>. No person shall disturb, tend to disturb, or aid in disturbing the peace of others by violent, tumultuous, offensive or obstreperous conduct, and no person shall knowingly permit such conduct upon any premises owned or possessed by him or under his control. (1984 Code, § 10-1001)
- 11-202. <u>Anti-noise regulations</u>. Subject to the provisions of this section, the creating of any unreasonably loud, disturbing and unnecessary noise is prohibited. Noise of such character, intensity, or duration as to be detrimental to the life or health of any individual, or in disturbance of the public peace and welfare is prohibited.
- (1) <u>Miscellaneous prohibited noises enumerated</u>. The following acts, among others, are declared to be loud, disturbing and unnecessary noises in violation of this section, but this enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclusive, namely:
 - (a) <u>Blowing horns</u>. The sounding of any horn or signal device on any automobile, motorcycle, bus, streetcar, or other vehicle while not in motion except as a danger signal if another vehicle is approaching, apparently out of control, or if in motion, only as a danger signal after or as brakes are being applied and deceleration of the vehicle is intended; the creation by means of any such signal device of any unreasonably loud or harsh sound; and the sounding of such device for an unnecessary and unreasonable period of time.
 - (b) Radios, phonographs, etc. The playing of any radio, phonograph or any musical instrument or sound device, including but not limited to loudspeakers or other devices for reproduction or amplification of sound, either independently of or in connection with motion pictures, radio or television, in such a manner or with such volume, particularly during the hours between 11:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M., as to annoy or disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of persons in any office or hospital, or in any dwelling, hotel or other type of residence, or of any person in the vicinity.
 - (c) <u>Yelling, shouting, hooting, etc.</u> Yelling, shouting, hooting, whistling, or singing on the public streets, particularly between the hours of 11:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M., or at any time or place so as to annoy or

disturb the quiet, comfort, or repose of any persons in any hospital, dwelling, hotel or other type of residence, or of any person in the vicinity.

- (d) <u>Pets</u>. The keeping of any animal, bird or fowl which by causing frequent or long continued noise shall disturb the comfort or repose of any person in the vicinity.¹
- (e) <u>Use of vehicle</u>. The use of any automobile, motorcycle, streetcar or vehicle so out of repair, so loaded, or in such manner as to cause loud and unnecessary grating, grinding, rattling or other noise.
- (f) <u>Blowing whistles</u>. The blowing of any steam whistle attached to any stationary boiler, except to give notice of the time to begin or stop work or as a warning of fire or danger, or upon request of proper municipal authorities.
- (g) <u>Exhaust discharge</u>. To discharge into the open air the exhaust of any steam engine, stationary internal combustion engine, motor vehicle or boat engine, except through a muffler or other device which will effectively prevent loud or explosive noises therefrom.
- (h) Building operations. The erection (including excavation), demolition, alteration, or repair of any building in any residential area or section or the construction or repair of streets and highways in any residential area or section, other than between the hours of 7:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M. on week days, except in case of urgent necessity in the interest of public health and safety, and then only with a permit from the building inspector granted for a period while the emergency continues not to exceed thirty (30) days. If the building inspector should determine that the public health and safety will not be impaired by the erection, demolition, alteration or repair of any building or the excavation of streets and highways between the hours of 6:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M., and if he shall further determine that loss or inconvenience would result to any party in interest through delay, he may grant permission for such work to be done between the hours of 6:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M. upon application being made at the time the permit for the work is awarded or during the process of the work.
- (i) <u>Noises near schools, hospitals, churches, etc.</u> The creation of any excessive noise on any street adjacent to any hospital or adjacent to any school, institution of learning, church or court while the same is in session.
- (j) <u>Loading and unloading operations</u>. The creation of any loud and excessive noise in connection with the loading or unloading of any vehicle or the opening and destruction of bales, boxes, crates, and other containers.

- (k) <u>Noises to attract attention</u>. The use of any drum, loudspeaker or other instrument or device emitting noise for the purpose of attracting attention to any performance, show or sale or display of merchandise.
- (l) <u>Loudspeakers or amplifiers on vehicles</u>. The use of mechanical loudspeakers or amplifiers on trucks or other moving or standing vehicles for advertising or other purposes.
- (2) <u>Exceptions</u>. None of the terms or prohibitions hereof shall apply to or be enforced against:
 - (a) <u>City vehicles</u>. Any vehicle of the city while engaged upon necessary public business.
 - (b) Repair of streets, etc. Excavations or repairs of bridges, streets or highways at night, by or on behalf of the city, the county, or the state, when the public welfare and convenience renders it impossible to perform such work during the day.
 - (c) Noncommercial and nonprofit use of loudspeakers or amplifiers. The reasonable use of amplifiers or loudspeakers in the course of public addresses which are noncommercial in character and in the course of advertising functions sponsored by nonprofit organizations. However, no such use shall be made until a permit therefor is secured from the recorder. Hours for the use of an amplifier or public address system will be designated in the permit so issued and the use of such systems shall be restricted to the hours so designated in the permit. INTERFERENCE WITH PUBLIC OPERATIONS AND PERSONNEL

- 11-301. Escape from custody or confinement.

- 11-301. Escape from custody or confinement. It shall be unlawful for any person under arrest or otherwise in custody of or confined by the city to escape or attempt to escape, or for any other person to assist or encourage such person to escape or attempt to escape from such custody or confinement. (1984 Code, § 10-701)
- 11-302. <u>False emergency alarms</u>. It shall be unlawful for any person to intentionally make, turn in, or give a false alarm of fire, or of need for police or ambulance assistance, or to aid or abet in the commission of such act. (1984 Code, § 10-705)
- 11-303. <u>Resisting or interfering with a policeman or fireman</u>. It shall be unlawful for any person to resist or in any way interfere with or attempt to interfere with any police officer or fireman while such officer is in the discharge or apparant discharge of his duty. (1984 Code, § 10-702)
- 11-304. <u>Coercing people not to work</u>. It shall be unlawful for any person in association or agreement with any other person to assemble, congregate or meet together in the vicinity of any premises where other persons are employed or reside for the purpose of inducing any such other person by threats, coercion, intimidation, or acts of violence to quit or refrain from entering a place of lawful employment. It is expressly not the purpose of this section to prohibit peaceful picketing. (1984 Code, § 10-302)
- 11-305. <u>Impersonating a government officer or employee</u>. No person other than an official police officer of the city shall wear the uniform, apparel, or badge, or carry any identification card or other insignia of office like or similar to, or a colorable imitation of that adopted and worn or carried by the official police officers of the city. Furthermore no person shall deceitfully impersonate or represent that he is any other government officer or employee. (1964 Code, § 10-703)

FIREARMS. WEAPONS AND MISSILES

- 11-401. Air rifles, etc.
- 11-402. Throwing missiles.
- 11-403. Discharge of firearms.
- 11-401. Air rifles, etc. It shall be unlawful for any person in the city to discharge any air gun, air pistol, air rifle, "BB" gun, or sling shot capable of discharging a metal bullet or pellet, whether propelled by spring, compressed air, expanding gas, explosive, or other force-producing means or method. (1984 Code, § 10-502)
- 11-402. <u>Throwing missiles</u>. It shall be unlawful for any person to maliciously throw any stone, snowball, bottle, or any other missile upon or at any vehicle, building, tree, or other public or private property or upon or at any person. (1984 Code, § 10-503)
- 11-403. <u>Discharge of firearms</u>. It shall be unlawful for any unauthorized person to discharge a firearm within the municipality. (1984 Code, § 10-501, modified)

MALICIOUS MISCHIEF AND INTERFERENCE WITH TRAFFIC

- 11-501. Malicious mischief.
- 11-502. Interference with traffic.
- 11-501. <u>Malicious mischief</u>. It shall be unlawful and deemed to be malicious mischief for any person to willfully, maliciously or wantonly damage, deface, destroy, conceal, tamper with, remove, withhold, or trespass upon any real, personal or public property or other property which does not belong to him. (1984 Code, § 10-806)
- 11-502. <u>Interference with traffic</u>. It shall be unlawful for any person to stand, sit, or engage in any activity whatever on any public street, sidewalk, bridge, or public ground in such a manner as to prevent, obstruct or interfere with the free passage of pedestrian or vehicular traffic thereon. (1984 Code, § 10-704)

MISCELLANEOUS

- 11-602. Caves, wells, cisterns, etc.

- 11-601. <u>Abandoned refrigerators, etc.</u> It shall be unlawful for any person to leave in any place accessible to children any abandoned, unattended, unused, or discarded refrigerator, icebox or other container with any type latching or locking door without first removing therefrom the latch, lock or door. (1984 Code, § 10-901)
- 11-602. <u>Caves, wells, cisterns, etc.</u> It shall be unlawful for any person to permit to be maintained on property owned or occupied by him any cave, well, cistern or other such opening in the ground which is dangerous to life and limb without an adequate cover or safeguard. (1984 Code, § 10-902)
- 11-603. <u>Posting notices, etc.</u> No person shall fasten, in any way, any show-card, poster or other advertising device upon any public or private property unless legally authorized to do so. (1984 Code, § 10-903)
- 11-604. <u>Curfew for minors</u>. It shall be unlawful for any minor, under the age of eighteen (18) years, to be abroad at night between the hours of 11:00 P.M. and 6:00 A.M. unless upon a legitimate errand or accompanied by a parent, guardian or other adult person having lawful custody of such minor. (1984 Code, § 10-1101)
- 11-605. <u>Fortune telling, etc.</u> It shall be unlawful for any person to hold himself forth to the public as a fortune teller, clairvoyant, hypnotist, spiritualist, palmist, phrenologist, or other mystic endowed with supernatural powers. (1984 Code, § 10-403)

MEETINGS

SECTION

11-701. Conduct during meetings; violations.

11-701. <u>Conduct during meetings; violations</u>. No person shall by his or her words, actions, gestures, deeds or other manifested conduct, while in the presence of a duly assembled meeting of the board of mayor and aldermen of the City of Waverly, Tennessee act in a disorderly manner or treat with contempt such meeting or those conducting the same, whereby such words, actions, gestures, deeds or other manifested conduct obstructs or impedes the conduct of business before such meeting. Any person violating the provisions hereof shall be fined \$50. (Ord. #1988-24, Dec. 1988)
