Annexation Moratorium

Before the Tennessee General Assembly adjourned, the Senate and House agreed on the Conference Committee Report on House Bill No. 475/ Senate Bill No. 279. This report reflects the final version of the bill that will soon be sent to the governor for his signature. The bill does the following:


- 1) Imposes a moratorium from April 15, 2013 to May 15, 2014, on annexation by ordinance upon the municipality's (does not apply to a municipality with a metro form of government) own initiative, pursuant to T.C.A. § 6-51-102, in order to annex territory being used for residential or agricultural purposes;
- 2) Prohibits any annexation described above from becoming operative during this time period;
- 3) Creates an exception to the aforementioned moratorium where a municipality has formally initiated an annexation ordinance and can show the municipality would suffer substantial and demonstrable financial injury if the ordinance does not become operative during the moratorium period. This requires approval by the county legislative body; and
- 4) Initiates a study of the state's annexation laws by the Tennessee Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations (TACIR) to be completed by January 14, 2014.

So, action on any such annexations ordinance as well as such an ordinance taking effect is prohibited during the moratorium imposed by this legislation. Thus a city with a proposed annexation as of April 15, 2013 has the following options:

- 1) Cease all further action on the proposed annexation and await the TACIR study and end of the moratorium;
- 2) Start from scratch and initiate the proposed annexation as annexation by resolutions pursuant to T.C.A. § 6-51-104;
- 3) Go back to the residents and property owners of the territory proposed for annexation and see if they are amenable to petitioning the city to annex the territory by ordinance pursuant to T.C.A. § 6-51-102(a)(1). The moratorium only prohibits annexation by ordinance by the city's own initiative, not where they are petitioned by a majority of the residents and property owners of the affected territory.

TREEDC Starts Pilot International Renewable Energy Exchange Program in the Philippines

The Tennessee Renewable Energy and Economic Development Council (TREEDC) has partnered with the Renewable Energy Association of the Philippines (REAP) to develop the TREEDC International Exchange Program wherein Philippine colleges and cities join and become members of the TREEDC network of 92 cities/counties and 23 colleges in Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas. TREEDC has identified the Philippines as the pilot country for this initiative. The mission of this program is to connect Tennessee and Philippine renewable energy stakeholders in order to create more awareness, progress and development of renewable energy in their respective areas and establish collaborative projects/programs.

In March, a TREEDC delegation consisting of President/Ducktown, Tennessee, Mayor James Talley, Director and UT Municipal Technical Advisory Service Consultant Warren Nevad and International Affairs Consultant Doug Jackson along with REAP President Oly Serafica met with chancellors, presidents and vice presidents representing the Central Bicol State University, Central Philippine University, University of Philippines Los Banos, Philippine Electronics and Communication Institute of Technology, Polytechnic University of the Philippines, Systems Plus College Foundation and Technological University of the Philippines. These educational institutions all agreed in principle to become members of the TREEDC network and to be matched with a sister school from the TREEDC college/university sector for information, research and technology exchanges. TREEDC plans to invite more Philippine schools and cities during the spring and summer. The TREEDC delegation will work with REAP to organize several community outreach forums at various schools across the country

in September. TREEDC also plans to replicate its renewable energy network developmental model in the Philippines.

TREEDC also met with Mayor Marino "Boking" Morales of Mabalacat City to invite him as an honorary mayor member of TREEDC. The delegation also met with CEMEX corporate officials to learn more about CEMEX's corporate social responsibility plans on environment and clean energy awareness. TREEDC President Talley said "The purpose of this exchange program is to exchange mutually beneficial resources and strategies for the advancement of renewable energy and related economic development in our respective countries." REAP President Serafica said that "TREEDC has committed to make the Philippines the TREEDC pilot country and worldwide model for the international exchange program and that REAP is eager to work with TREEDC to make this program a success."

TREEDC is a non-profit network of cities, universities, and private businesses with the mission of providing leadership in promoting renewable energy and economic development for member organizations. TREEDC is affiliated with the University of Tennessee and currently includes 92 local

governments, nine state and federal agencies, 23 colleges and universities, 60 commercial businesses and power utilities and three international organizations. The chairman of TREEDC is University of Tennessee President Emeritus Dr. Joe Johnson. TREEDC was awarded the Governor's Excellence in Energy Leadership by the state of Tennessee in 2012. On April 6, the city of Crossville mayor and council held a Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Threat (SWOT) Assessment that was facilitated by MTAS Management Consultant Warren Nevad.

After several hours of deliberations, the top four goals chosen by the council at the included 1) a merger with South Cumberland Utility District; 2) preparation of an inter-local orientation package to share goals with the county and the chamber of commerce, 3) a pilot single stream recycling program and 4) investigation into the possibility of a self-funded health insurance program for employees in order to control costs.

During the assessments, the city developed a long list of the community's strengths including the city's location

within driving distance of a large percentage of the U.S. population, the proximity of the interstate for transportation, and nearby education including colleges. Other strengths included low taxes, low cost of living and low utility rates. Council members also saw strengths in the recreation and arts including golf courses, the Palace Theatre and the Cumberland County Playhouse, recreation parks and facilities and sports organizations.

The city adopted a resolution at the May meeting approving the top four goals to be implemented during the 2013-2014 fiscal year.
